Science & Engineering Practices	<p>Science & Engineering Practices</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students will construct an explanation for the patterns of interactions observed in different ecosystems in terms of the relationships among and between organisms and abiotic components of the ecosystem. Students will develop a model to describe the cycling of matter and the flow of energy among biotic and abiotic components of an ecosystem. Students will analyze and interpret data to provide evidence for how resource availability, disease, climate, and human activity affect individual organisms, populations, communities, and ecosystems. Students will ask questions to gather and synthesize information from multiple sources to differentiate between Earth's major terrestrial biomes and aquatic ecosystems. 	<p>Science & Engineering Practices</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students will develop a model and construct an explanation of how cell structures contribute to the function of the cell as a system in obtaining nutrients in order to grow, reproduce, make needed materials, and process waste. Students will develop and use a conceptual model of how cells are organized into tissues, tissues into organs, organs into systems, and systems into organisms. Students will construct an argument that systems of the body interact with one another to carry out life processes. 	<p>Science & Engineering Practices</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students will construct an explanation supported with scientific evidence of the role of genes and chromosomes in the process of inheriting a specific trait. Students will develop and use a model to describe how asexual reproduction can result in offspring with identical genetic information while sexual reproduction results in genetic variation. 	<p>Science & Engineering Practices</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students will ask questions to gather and synthesize information about the ways humans influence the inheritance of desired traits in organisms through selective breeding. Students will use mathematical representations to evaluate explanations of how natural selection leads to changes in specific traits of populations over successive generations. Students will construct an explanation based on evidence that describes how genetic variation and environmental factors influence the probability of survival and reproduction of a species. Students will analyze and interpret data for patterns in the fossil record that document the existence, diversity, and extinction of organisms and their relationships to modern organisms. 	<p>Science & Engineering Practices</p> <ul style="list-style-type: none"> Students will develop and defend a model that categorizes organisms based on common characteristics. Students will evaluate historical models of how organisms were classified based on physical characteristics and how that led to the six kingdom system (currently archaea, bacteria, protists, fungi, plants, and animals).
